PERFECT PARADISE OF PAST AND PRESENT



1. Spionkop Lodge is situated midway between Durban and Johannesburg and was established by Raymond and Lynette Heron in 1998. There are 11 double **en suite** bedrooms and two stone cottages. It is a family-owned and -operated lodge.
2. It is an oasis in a pleasant **expanse of grassland**, on a 703-hectare working farm, at the foot of the mighty Drakensberg Mountains of KwaZulu-Natal. A place where one is able to escape the world, and live in a dream of tranquility, for a moment in time.
3. At Spionkop one hears long-ago sounds of warriors, horsemen and soldiers, and remembered tales of fierce battles of Boer, Brit and Zulu. In this place, our resident historians Raymond and Alastair Heron paint a **vivid** picture of the personal trauma and military mindset that resulted in the slaughter of so many British and Boer soldiers.
4. They also tell how the South African war of 1899 to 1902 brought together three significant characters of modern history: Winston Churchill, who became the prime minister of Great Britain, Louis Botha, who became the first prime minister of the Union of South Africa in 1910, and Mahatma Gandhi, a stretcher bearer with the Ambulance Core.
5. Through these many fascinating stories, one is able to feel the quiet serenity that weaves a spell on your heart and **rejuvenates** your soul.
6. Guests can enjoy battlefield tours, horse rides among the game, sunset boat cruises or game drives, fishing, hiking, mountain-biking or hearing the Drakensberg Boys' Choir. In the evening, in front of a crackling log fire, one can savour wholesome meals in the company of the hosts and fellow guests and they can also observe the magnificent night sky of the Southern Cross and Milky Way.
7. From the ashes of the destruction of war has risen the inspiring and hugely successful Spionkop Educational Project that hosts volunteers from a university and two schools in the UK. Added to this is the exchange programme for rural teachers to experience teaching in the UK.

8. These activities are attractive to both local and international guests who have varied interests of berg, bush and battlefields.
9. To sum up, Spionkop Lodge is best described by a guest in this way: "I found a place in Africa and will carry a little piece of it in my heart forever."

1. Askari Game Lodge and Spa is a luxury lodge with an overnight price tag of R1 760 per person. Thankfully day visitors are welcome. Treat your family to one of these outings:
2. **Have a hard-to-beat breakfast.** Day visitors can have a breakfast from 8:00 to 10:00. The buffet has hot and cold dishes, croissants, cheeses, fruit and bottomless coffee – it will tide you over until dinner!

Cost: R 150 per person.

Where? Turn off the Hekpoort Road (R 560) onto the R 465. Askari is 6 km further.

Malaria protection for the whole family



1. Malaria is a disease caused by parasites which are carried by mosquitoes.
2. It is important to know in which areas of South Africa malaria occurs. Malaria occurs mainly in the low altitude areas of Limpopo, Mpumalanga and North Eastern KwaZulu-Natal. It may occasionally occur in the North West and Northern Cape provinces along the Orange and Molopo Rivers.
3. There is a higher risk of malaria during the hot summer months from September to May in South Africa, although it may occur during the cooler months as well.
4. When travelling into a malaria-area it is important to get the correct medication from your doctor depending on your age and other medication you might be taking. Medication should be taken before you go into the area and continued after your return home.

5. When you are outdoors it is essential to wear long-sleeved shirts and long trousers.
6. Insect repellents should be used during the day and at night. A good idea would be to sleep under a mosquito net. It can also help if the windows and doors are covered with mosquito screens. Special care should be taken so that children are protected at all times. It is advised that pregnant women and babies should rather not travel into malaria-areas.
7. When returning from a malaria-area, regard any flu-like illness or fever as malaria and visit your doctor to start treatment immediately.
