Greatness in a matchbox lights up Black City

- 1 It had the elements of an MTV live performance – the talented band, the fans and the chic venue. Black City, a Durban-based eclectic pop band, debuted at The Chairman, an upmarket jazz bar in the trendy Point precinct, on Thursday night.
- 2 The band's single, *Vilakazi Street*, has made waves on local radio stations, and their popularity was evident from the stylish crowd they attracted. Before the band took to the stage, musicians, socialites and music lovers mingled over pizza and drinks.
- 3 Many lounged on the oversized couches, soaking up the ambience and decor – from mounted vinyl album covers of Miles Davis and Thelonious Monk to animal trophies and imposing chandeliers.
4. Walking stick in hand, the city's celebrated author and playwright, Ronnie Govender, had also made his way to the venue to support the band. Zimbabwean lawyer Tonderai Chigumundu was excited about Black City's appearance.
5. "I've always had a passion for local talent. I heard that they were playing and thought I had to be here in the audience."
6. Jazz fans Kirsten Stokes and Julie Dancaster, dressed in black ensembles, were as enthusiastic.
7. "Apparently they are quite talented and we had to see for ourselves," Stokes piped up.
8. One of the lead singers, Yogan Naidoo, shed some light on Vilakazi Street.
"Vilakazi Street is by far the most famous street in South Africa, being the only street in the world to have once had Nelson Mandela and Desmond Tutu live there.
"The street is a metaphor for life in general and South Africans in particular, proving that out of the modest matchbox houses of Soweto global greatness can arise."

Lucky Dube book launched Siyabonga Sithole

- 1 Lucky Dube's manager, Lenah Mochoele, has put pen to paper to write a book in honour of the reggae star who died in 2007.
- 2 Dube's death was met with shock and fury by South Africans when the news of his shooting broke out.
- 3 Titled *Walking a Mile in Your Shoes – My Spiritual Journey with Lucky Dube*, Mochoele said the book gives an account of the spiritual journey of this South African-born, world-famous reggae star and hit-maker.
- 4 "His rise from a simple rural life is told in spiritual stories that cast a different light on the straight-talking reggae star," Mochoele said.
- 5 Monday marks Dube's 54th birthday.
- 6 With over 22 albums in a career spanning 25 years, Dube was South Africa's biggest selling reggae artist, celebrated the world over for the social messages of his music.
- 7 Mochoele met Dube when she was still with Gallo as his business manager. She worked with Dube exclusively for four years until his last days.
- 8 She said the book will give South Africans a clearer picture of Dube as father, brother and artist.
- 9 The book, which is already available online, will be launched alongside a new CD titled *Celebrate Life – Our tribute*, a collaboration by Dube's band which has continued with his legacy through international tours.
- 10 Mochoele said the album and book serve as proof that the show goes on and even though Dube may be gone, he died having created a platform for those that worked with him to continue in his footsteps.

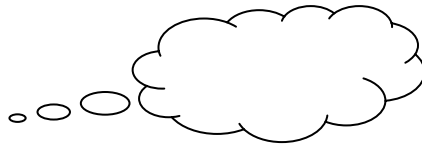

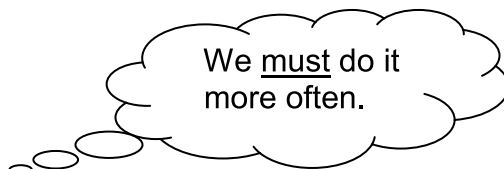

The Gautrain: Singing to the rhythm of the railway.

In the past in South Africa, songs were written about the trains that carried the men away from their families and homes, across distant lands and over mountains to the mines in Johannesburg. These men, both young and old, worked deep underground, digging and drilling for gold. These songs represented their sense of hopelessness and resentment for the trains that separated them from the people and places they loved.

The most well-known of these songs include *Stimela* (coal train) and *Shosholoza*. *Stimela* starts with the repetitive sound of banging against a tin container. The sound reminds the listener of the sound the trains make as they carried the men to the mines. It is a sad song about loss and displacement and is haunting to listen to. *Shosholoza* is a more upbeat and energetic song but, here too, the words are not as cheerful as the joyful aliveness which the music suggests. Both songs are reminders of the voices from deep within the earth that refuse to let their sacrifice be forgotten.

With this negative association that South Africans have of trains in mind, it has been quite a turnaround when *Shosholoza* was sung, amid fireworks and beating drums, at the grand and exciting opening of the Gautrain – a public transport system between Pretoria and Johannesburg that reduces the amount of traffic on the highway. The Gautrain is a leap forward in terms of public transport in the country and will serve as a benchmark against which all transportation developments on the continent will be measured. Furthermore, it is a huge step towards making the city of Johannesburg a “world-class” city.
