With each of these three advancements – the steam engine, the age of science and mass production, and the rise of digital technology – the world around us has fundamentally changed. Right now, it's happening again, for a fourth time. 5
2. During the **First Industrial Revolution** in the 18th and 19th centuries people started moving to cities for work. Steam engines were used to do hard work. This was the age of textiles and iron.
3. The **Second Industrial Revolution** was the era when mass production and factory lines were started. This was at the beginning of the 20th 10 century.

4. The **Third Industrial Revolution** is also known as the Digital Revolution. This started around the 1980s. People started using personal computers and the internet everywhere.
5. The **Fourth Industrial Revolution** continues along the same lines as the previous one. Technology is now part of our everyday lives. Examples are robotics, artificial intelligence and driverless cars. 15
6. We do not know how the Fourth Industrial Revolution will affect young people. It is safe to say that every job in the future will need technology. Teachers will have technology that helps them to teach and plan. Their lessons will be planned to students' individual needs. Doctors and nurses will use technology to improve health care and surgery will be done using robots. In banks, people are already replaced with software. 20
7. People will have to become learners throughout their lives. Two billion young people could be at risk of missing out on jobs of the technological future. Urgent action must be taken to make them ready to succeed. In the future there will be many new jobs that no-one has heard of before! Young people are in danger of being left behind unless they get the skills needed to succeed. 25
8. We must prepare students by giving them confidence, experience and curiosity for the future. The Youth Skills and Innovation Initiative has been launched to bring together partners from the business community, government officials and youth representatives. Four important sets of skills that youth will need have been identified. 30
9. Firstly, workforce readiness is needed. This means the basic skills needed to get a job and be successful. Young people need to show up every day, manage time effectively and present themselves well. 35
10. Young people also need to learn soft skills. This means being able to communicate and work with a range of people, including colleagues, customers and management. 40
11. A third skills set is having technical knowledge and capabilities to do a specific job such as computer programming, coding, etc.
12. The last skills set includes the knowledge and ability to set up a business and run it well. Entrepreneurship will determine success. 45

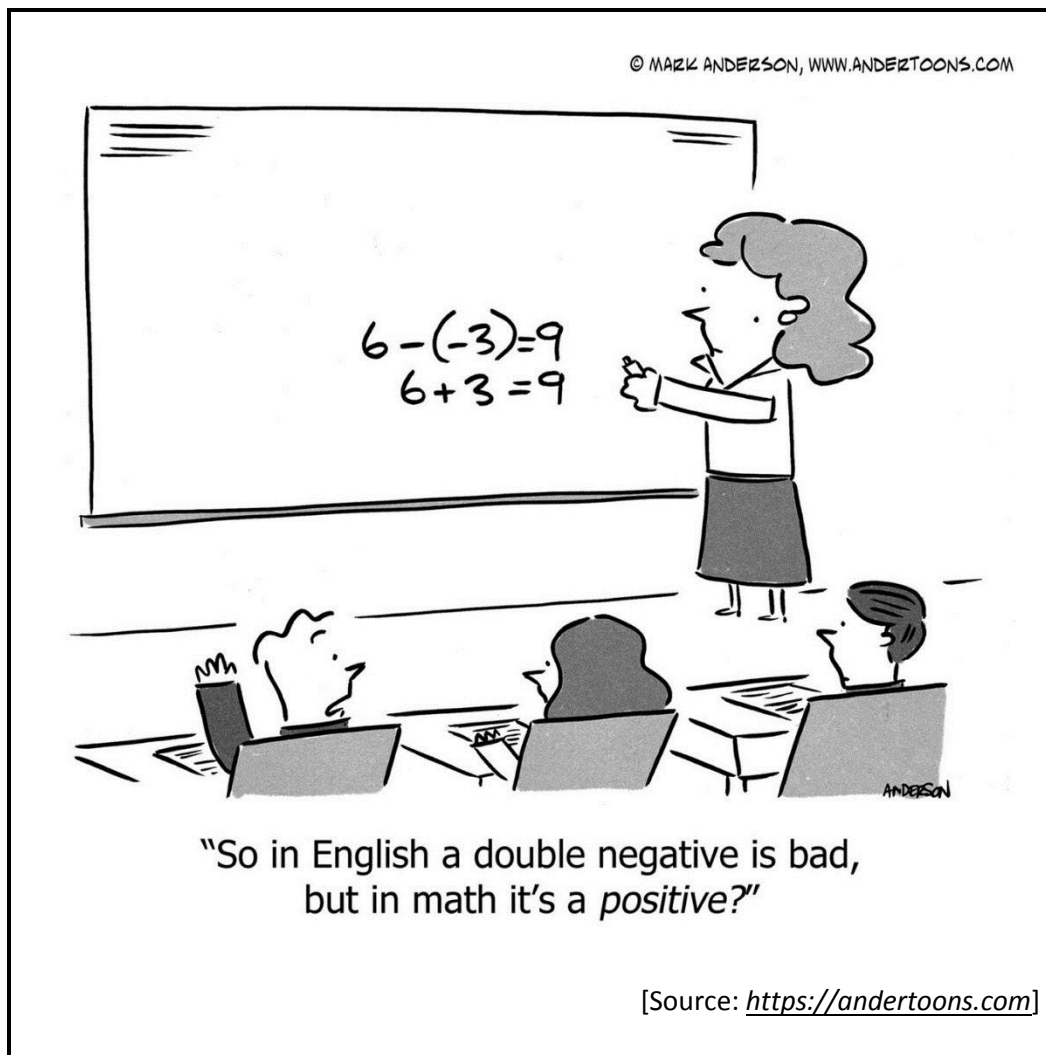

TEXT D**South Africa's plan for the Fourth Industrial Revolution**

Former President Kgalema Motlanthe formed a Foundation to help prepare young South Africans for the future. He says they are at the heart of the success and must be empowered.

Several programmes have been identified to make sure that South Africa is ready.

In the first place young people are encouraged to participate in youth talks at the Nasrec Expo Centre. It is important that young people talk about their needs and have a chance to air their views.

In-service training will be conducted where specific skills will be taught. It is also known as vocational training and centres are ready to train young people. Microsoft has planned to support a million youths by 2023.

The MLab programme will train young people in cellular technology. Various courses will be available based on the use of cell phones.

Industrial Development Centres will be formed to support women and young people.

Huawei formed a Seeds of the Future Programme to train people in electronics. The company will be supporting various training programmes.

A partnership has been formed with Google since 2017 and 131 980 young people have already been trained.

The South African Network Academy Programme (CISCO), has trained 10 590 young people to date.

All these programmes will empower our youth by teaching the necessary skills for the Fourth Industrial Revolution.
